Notes From Mrs. Dockter

Reminder: School pictures are October 1.

The elementary students have begun their fall Measures of Academic Progress (MAP) Testing. MAP Testing is administered in the fall, winter, and spring. This test assesses students' achievement and growth in math, reading, language arts, and science. The teachers use MAP Growth to understand how students are performing and track student progress.

Our reading program is underway. Reminder we are going by points this year. Once a student has finished reading a book, the student is to let their classroom teacher know. The teacher will give the student a 10-

question quiz. If the student gets 7 or more questions correct, they will receive points for reading the book. The points will be totaled quarterly. The end of the 1st quarter is October 15.

As October begins, so does cooler weather. Please make sure your child comes to school dressed appropriately for the conditions. We want all students to feel comfortable and safe while learning and playing outside.

Zeeland Public School received a grant from the McIntosh County Health Unit for keeping kids active. With that grant the school purchased a Climbing Dome.

Thank you to Kevin, Mr. Anderson, and Mr. Streifel for putting the dome together and to Zeeland Oil for donating the sand.



ECO-ED CONSERVATION TOUR: A Day of Outdoor Learning for Grade 6 - 7!

On September 16, our Grade 6 and 7 students had the incredible opportunity to participate in the Eco–Ed Conservation Tour, held at the scenic Beaver Lake State Park. This exciting and educational outdoor experience was made possible through the support of the Logan County Soil Conservation District Board of Supervisors.

Students spent the day exploring and learning about the unique ecological conditions found right here in North Dakota. Through hands-on activities and expert-led presentations, they gained a deeper appreciation for the environment and better understanding of how to care for it.

Throughout the tour, students rotated through a series of interactive learning stations. Each focused on a key component of our natural world, such as:

- Soil, understanding soil health and how it supports ecosystem functions.
- Trees, the role of forests in conservation and habitat management and protection.
- Water Quality, learning how clean water is tested and why it truly matters.
- Wetlands & Wildlife, discovering the ecological importance of wetlands and their role in supporting biodiversity.
- Range Pasture, investigating sustainable land use and grazing practices
- Duck Wing, identifying local duck and bird species through an engaging hands-on approach.

Experiences like the Eco-Ed Tour help students connect what they learn in the classroom to the real world. They not only learn about environmental science, but also about the role each person plays in protecting our planet – **Earth**.

(Unofficial Minutes)

President Meier called the Public Budget Hearing to order at 7:00 p.m. on September 8, 2025. Board members present were Francis Meier, Jen Meier, Donavon Bender, Josh Rossow and Neil Meidinger. Others present were Supt. Brandt Dick, Jayden Streifel, Kim Dockter, Kyle Anderson and Bs. Mgr Joyce Scherr. Two property owners from the Zeeland School District attended.

At this time Supt Brandt Dick took over.

- 1. Zeeland will experience less pupil aid money next year due to low enrollment. In addition to lower student count, the transition payment will be approximately cut in half due to state law phasing out the transition payment.
- 2. The new 3% cap worksheet and levy worksheets were gone over. Mr. Dick explained the new calculation and how the amount of money the school will receive is calculated.
- 3. The mill levy did not raise. If your taxes increase it is due to valuation increasing. \$532,500 is the most that can be levied. Expenses are higher then revenue, this is common for ZPS and normally the expenses don't reach the budgeted amount.
- 4. ZPS will continue to have a deficit and will need to continue to watch spending. With no questions, Rossow made a motion to accept the budget for the for the 2025-2026 school year, second Bender.

Meidinger made a motion to adjourn, second J. Meier. All Aye.

President Meier called the regular board meeting to order.

Meidinger made a motion to approve the agenda, second Bender. All Aye.

With the correction of the dates for PD to August 12 and 13, J. Meier made a motion to approve the minutes, second Rossow. All Aye.

The financial reports were reviewed. J. Meier made a motion to approve the financial reports as presented by the Bs. Mgr and payment of the following claims, second Rossow. City of Zeeland 83.91; BEK 112.19; DRN 760.00; MDU 655.24; Emmons Co Record 110.24; Zeeland Oil LLC 679.05; Dakota Dust Tex 251.80; IPrint Technologies 170.00; SoftChoice 575.43; Strasburg Public School 400.00; CREA 900.00; K. Kocher 51.62; Professional Speech Therapist 375.00; VISA 581.83; Dacotah Paper 375.06 and BCBS 4,624.99. Motion carried to approve.

Supt. Report – Budget presentation.

HS Lead – Mr. Streifel informed the board we have 18 students. Things have been going well.

Map testing dates will be set.

Upcoming events – Sept 16 Logan Co ECOED for grades 6 & 7; Sept. 17 Steered Straight @ Ashley for high school in the morning and elementary in the afternoon. Parents are invited at in evening at 6:30.

STARS reports are being completed.

The new playground climbing gym was set up this summer on the playground. This was purchased with grant money from the Ashley Health Unit.

Elem. Lead – Mrs. Dockter is working on the Reading Compliance Report that needs to be done every three years. Several teachers will need training for meeting compliance.

Amira is a reading program through the state that is free and we will again be using it.

Rossow asked whether the leads with their schedules are they able to get everything done. Both felt all was going well.

Public comment - None.

Old Business – The bus that has been tagged with an accident that was purchased earlier was taken to Ashley for inspection and passed. We may now renew with a salvaged title. Annual Compliance Report. Supt Dick explained that each year a school must prove they are meeting requirements and follow guidelines to be operational. Meidinger made a motion to approve the Annual Compliance Report, second Bender. All Aye.

Dear Parents and ZPS staff,

McIntosh Public Health will be offering flu shots at ZPS on Tuesday, October 7, 2025 10:00-10:30 a.m. to all school aged children and school staff. We will be also offering flu shots to the general public during that time.

The Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices (ACIP) recommends annual influenza vaccination for all people ages 6 months and up. Attached is the Vaccine Information Statement for the inactivated influenza vaccine.

In order for you or your child to receive a flu immunization, please complete the flu vaccination consent form with insurance or ND Medicaid information. The completed form must be returned to the school office by Monday October 6th.

We will be offering flu shots for uninsured adults and children 6 months and up at the cost of \$20, due at time of service.

If you have any questions about the flu shot, need assistance with completing the consent form or wish to schedule an office appointment, do not hesitate to call our office at 288-3957.

VACCINE INFORMATION STATEMENT

Influenza (Flu) Vaccine (Inactivated or Recombinant): What you need to know

1. Why get vaccinated?

Influenza vaccine can prevent influenza (flu).

Flu is a contagious disease that spreads around the United States every year, usually between October and May. Anyone can get the flu, but it is more dangerous for some people. Infants and young children, people 65 years and older, pregnant women, and people with certain health conditions or a weakened immune system are at greatest risk of flu complications.

Pneumonia, bronchitis, sinus infections, and ear infections are examples of flu-related complications. If you have a medical condition, such as heart disease, cancer, or diabetes, flu can make it worse.

Flu can cause fever and chills, sore throat, muscle aches, fatigue, cough, headache, and runny or stuffy nose. Some people may have vomiting and diarrhea, though this is more common in children than adults.

In an average year, **thousands of people in the United States die from flu**, and many more are hospitalized. Flu vaccine prevents millions of illnesses and flu-related visits to the doctor each year.

2. Influenza vaccines

CDC recommends everyone 6 months and older get vaccinated every flu season. **Children 6 months through 8 years of age** may need 2 doses during a single flu season. **Everyone else** needs only 1 dose each flu season.

It takes about 2 weeks for protection to develop after vaccination.

There are many flu viruses, and they are always changing. Each year a new flu vaccine is made to protect against the influenza viruses believed to be likely to cause disease in the upcoming flu season. Even when the vaccine doesn't exactly match these viruses, it may still provide some protection.

Influenza vaccine does not cause flu.

Influenza vaccine may be given at the same time as other vaccines.

3. Talk with your health care provider

Tell your vaccination provider if the person getting the vaccine:

- Has had an allergic reaction after a previous dose of influenza vaccine, or has any severe, lifethreatening allergies
- Has ever had Guillain-Barré Syndrome (also called "GBS")

In some cases, your health care provider may decide to postpone influenza vaccination until a future visit.

Influenza vaccine can be administered at any time during pregnancy. Women who are or will be pregnant during influenza season should receive inactivated influenza vaccine.

People with minor illnesses, such as a cold, may be vaccinated. People who are moderately or severely ill should usually wait until they recover before getting influenza vaccine.

Your health care provider can give you more information.



4. Risks of a vaccine reaction

- Soreness, redness, and swelling where the shot is given, fever, muscle aches, and headache can happen after influenza vaccination.
- There may be a very small increased risk of Guillain-Barré Syndrome (GBS) after inactivated influenza vaccine (the flu shot).

Young children who get the flu shot along with pneumococcal vaccine (PCV13) and/or DTaP vaccine at the same time might be slightly more likely to have a seizure caused by fever. Tell your health care provider if a child who is getting flu vaccine has ever had a seizure.

People sometimes faint after medical procedures, including vaccination. Tell your provider if you feel dizzy or have vision changes or ringing in the ears.

As with any medicine, there is a very remote chance of a vaccine causing a severe allergic reaction, other serious injury, or death.

5. What if there is a serious problem?

An allergic reaction could occur after the vaccinated person leaves the clinic. If you see signs of a severe allergic reaction (hives, swelling of the face and throat, difficulty breathing, a fast heartbeat, dizziness, or weakness), call 9-1-1 and get the person to the nearest hospital.

For other signs that concern you, call your health care provider.

Adverse reactions should be reported to the Vaccine Adverse Event Reporting System (VAERS). Your health care provider will usually file this report, or you can do it yourself. Visit the VAERS website at www.vaers.hhs.gov or call 1-800-822-7967. VAERS is only for reporting reactions, and VAERS staff members do not give medical advice.

6. The National Vaccine Injury **Compensation Program**

The National Vaccine Injury Compensation Program (VICP) is a federal program that was created to compensate people who may have been injured by certain vaccines. Claims regarding alleged injury or death due to vaccination have a time limit for filing, which may be as short as two years. October 20—24 Marks National School Bus Safety Week

Getting students to and from school on a bus has been a part of our culture for many years. Students and families rely on the school bus for getting to the classroom, and over the years lots has changed in the safety of this mode of transportation. Safe Kids Grand Forks has bus safety instructors on our team that offer these tips for keeping students safe:

- ⇒ Most incidents involving school buses happen outside the bus. Teach students waiting for pick up to stand 3 giant steps away from where the bus will pull up, and when they get off the bus, step away from it right away.
- ⇒ Remove backpacks and sit with your back against the seat back and facing forward. Never sit or stand in the aisles or put more than 2-3 people on a seat. If there are seatbelts on the bus, use them.
- ⇒ When crossing the street in front of the bus, stop at the edge of it, look at the driver, and wait for a signal from them that it is safe to cross. While the STOP arm may be out, some drivers don't obey it, making it dangerous to cross.
- ⇒ Some students may have special needs and would benefit from a safety restraint on the bus. If students are in wheelchairs, learn the proper way for them to be loaded with the lift and assure the transportation team knows to secure the chair with 4 points on the floor. Many students on the autism spectrum can benefit from a safety restraint that helps keep them in their seat, or small children can be better secured in a car seat. Our team at Safe Kids Grand Forks would be happy to help assess bus safety options for families and students. Please reach out if we can be of assistance with this transportation need.



UAULUWUEW SAFETY TIPS

- Keep costumes creative, but make sure they fit well and aren't oversized. Keep them safe with reflective tape or glow sticks.
- Carry a flashlight to be seen more easily or a mylar bag that catches the light. (We have them FREE at our office!!)
- Stick to familiar areas, stay in groups, and if under 12, take an adult. Only go to homes with lights on out front.
- Always walk on sidewalks or paths, crossing the street at signals and corners where there is light to be more visible. Be sure to make eye contact with the driver before crossing so you know they have seen you.
- Avoid dark colored costumes that make trick-or-treaters hard to be seen in low light conditions, and use face paint rather than a mask which limits your ability to see.
- If trick-or-treating by car, even with a costume on, it is important to buckle up in your car or booster seat or seatbelt.
- Consider attending a community Halloween event that is often indoors or a trunk-or-treat event that is in an enclosed parking lot. Or, think about hosting your own Halloween party and avoiding the outdoors all together.
